EAB3002: Principles of Behavior Analysis

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Welcome & Overview

Why do you do what you do? Why do you feel, think, imagine? Why do you procrastinate? Why is Xavier so passive-aggressive? Why won't that anxiety just go away? Understanding causes of behavior is one central aim of this course, and we'll approach this endeavor from a natural science perspective. Another aim of the course is to actually apply this understanding to solve real-world behavior problems. Indeed, most of the problems we face in contemporary culture are behavioral in nature. Consider phobias, depression, drug addiction, crime, prejudice, eating disorders, and the list can go on and on. What's exciting is that the principles we will cover can solve these problems; we have the data.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, you will be able to:

- Think critically about the causes of behavior, human and non-human, using specific tools of scientific thinking.
- Understand how a natural science of behavior, especially respondent conditioning and operant learning, can help us understand behavior and experience.
- Apply this knowledge in every possible way to your own and others' behavior and experience, and solve socially important problems.

More ambitiously: I hope this course changes your life.

Course Description

This course is a fully online course with no specified meeting times. However, the course is not self-paced. Each week, new course modules will be due. Modules 1-7 will open at the start of the term, and modules 8-14 will open at the midpoint. So, you can definitely work ahead as much as you want within each half of the term. Just be sure you complete the modules by the due dates listed in Canvas. **Summer A is a absolute sprint - plan accordingly!** For each module you will be given an overview of the scheduled activities so that you will know what you are expected to do for that module.

Getting Started Quiz & Module Quizzes

- Getting started. By the date specified on the quiz, complete the Getting Started quiz. By completing this quiz, you agree to all rules of the course. This quiz also assesses your knowledge of the syllabus.
- There will be 13 Module Quizzes during the semester. Content will be drawn from the book and lecture.
- Quizzes are timed. The questions are answerable in the time allotted if you have taken measures to prepare yourself (much like you would for an in-person course). However, if

you try to look up the answers to each question and watch videos you will (very) likely run out of time.

Discussions

10 pts each x 7 = 70 points

- 7 Discussion forums, 10 points per forum.
- Posts will only count if they were posted before the deadline.
- I encourage you to view others' posts; get exposed to other perspectives. There is no requirement to reply to others' posts, but feel free to do so!

Portfolio

10 pts each 6 = 60 points

- You will build a portfolio during the semester. The focus of the portfolio is to apply concepts and principles to real world phenomena.
- In many cases, the portfolio entries will build upon the discussion topics from the previous week.
- Portfolio entries will be made in the Assignments tab in Canvas.

• You will reflect on how the portfolio assignments helped you address the big goals listed in the first paragraph of this syllabus. You will also have the chance to tell us how you might revise any of your portfolio assignments based on feedback and/or new learning.

Certification as a Board Certified Associate Behavior Analyst (BCaBA) and Specialization Track in Behavior Analysis

- The Department of Psychology at the University of Florida has a Behavior Analysis Certification Board® (BACB)-verified course sequence that prepares students to sit for the BCaBA exam after graduation with a bachelor's degree. EAB 3002 is one course in this sequence, click here to see the full sequence. Students who successfully complete this sequence will automatically meet the coursework requirement to qualify for the exam. In addition to this coursework, the student will have to complete a minimum of 1000 hours of supervised practical experience in behavior analysis.
- Full-time UF students are eligible to complete the sequence, regardless of major (i.e., non-psychology majors can complete the requirements and site for the BCaBA exam). At this time only residential UF students are eligible, UFO students are not eligible.
- The Department of Psychology also offers a <u>specialization</u> track in Behavior Analysis. The curriculum includes coursework in behavior analysis, psychology, statistics, mathematics, and biology. The specialization also allows the option to conduct a senior honors thesis. The behavior analysis coursework includes a very similar Behavior Analysis Certification Board (BACB)-verified course sequence, as described above, that prepares students to sit for the BCaBA exam after graduation.

Ouizzes

I release the correct answers to quiz questions right after the quiz window closes. So obviously, allowing more time after the quiz window has closed and the correct answers are viewable is not possible.

Make-up Quizzes

At the midpoint of the semester, and again at the end of the semester, you will have the opportunity to take a make-up quiz. These quizzes can substitute for any missed quiz. If you took all of the quizzes and want to drop your lowest grade, the make-up quiz (or quizzes) will be counted in place of your lowest quiz. Let's say you take all the module quizzes and one make-up quiz and your score on your make-up quiz was your lowest, then your make-up score will be dropped. The make-up quizzes only apply to module quizzes. They does not apply to other class components like discussions or portfolio assignments. If you miss discussion posts or portfolio entries, those will stand as zeros unless you have a university accepted excuse.

The make-up quiz questions will be drawn from previous modules. So at the middle of the semester, the quiz will draw 10 questions from the module 1-6 quizzes. At the end of the semester, the quiz will draw 10 questions from module 8-13 quizzes.
