# EAB 4714C: Laboratory in Applied Behavior Analysis Syllabus, Fall 2023

#### General

Undergraduate lab meetings (EAB 4714C) (room 130 Psychology): Mondays, 11:45 pm ~ 1:30 pm (plus other lab activities: approximately 2-4 hours/week, see below)

### **Other Lab Activities**

You will be assigned to one of six groups. Students will participate in the following activities throughout the semester. Each week we will announce these activities by assigned group, sometimes you will have a choice of which to attend. Each week you are likely to do **ONE** of these types of activities (**not the entire list!**).

- 1. Applied research/clinical apprenticeship. Duties will include but are not limited to: behavioral observation, data analysis, scoring videos, literature reviews, etc. These could take place at UF CAN (center for autism and neurodevelopment) or on campus, or as independently assigned work.
- 2. Specialty clinic rounds. Duties will include attending clinical case reviews for specialty clinics in pediatric feeding, severe behavior, and early learning. These could involve zoom or in-person meetings at UF CAN.
- 3. Flex lab. Duties will include attending BARC (third floor of psychology building) to complete lab-related assignments or to meet with research team members or TAs. The time you select is largely "flexible," but from a choice among available scheduled times. This is in room 375 Psychology.
- 4. Graduate student lab meeting. Duty will be to attend lab meeting on Monday (4-6 PM), and to carry out assignments discussed at that meeting. This takes place on campus or via zoom.
- 5. Monthly lab meeting. Duty will be to attend monthly larger lab meeting that includes professors, post-doctoral associates, and graduate students. This takes place at UF CAN or via zoom.
- 6. Presentations. Duty will be to attend announced presentations in various forums (seminars, undergraduate clubs, guest presenters).
- 7. Independent activity. Duty will be to carry out an independent activity such as an on-line training, data analysis, lab exercise, etc.

## **Description**

This is a course on research methods and applications in behavior analysis. It is designed around a working laboratory so that advanced undergraduate students can experience conditions similar to those encountered in graduate school. Thus, course content changes somewhat from semester-

to-semester based on current research in progress. General topics to be covered include but are not limited to observation of human behavior in applied settings, assessment of interobserver agreement, data graphing and analysis, reinforcer assessments, functional analysis of behavior disorders, ethics, and intervention strategies. Although most of the assigned readings and lab work focus on specialized topics, the skills taught are general in nature and provide you with a strong empirical background for graduate study in a range of different areas (e.g., psychology, public health, rehabilitation, special education).

By the end of the semester, students will be able to:

- 1. Perform research activities and clinical behavior analysis skills, including but not limited to collecting data, calculating interobserver agreement, graphing, and conducting preference assessments.
- 2. Discuss and critique published research.
- 3. Discuss and answer questions about current research projects and behavior analysis ethics.
- 4. Display an ongoing lab log of lab activities.

#### **Text**

All course-related information including reading assignments will be posted on the Canvas website. Please check the site frequently because assignment changes will be posted there.

## Lab Meetings

The weekly on-campus lab meeting is held on Mondays from 11:45 AM until about 1:30 PM. Most weeks, the meeting will include a) a quiz over the reading assignment and the prior meeting's discussion, b) announcements and introductions from Dr. Vollmer and Angie, c) a review of the reading assignment, and its relation to one of our lab's research programs, d) a summary of new or recent research in the lab or work being done by one of the groups in our lab, e) group discussion, and f) introduction to your weekly lab assignment.

### Lab Activities

- a) You will attend on-campus Monday lab meeting
- b) You will attend your assigned lab activity (see list above). These activities will vary but will be announced weekly.
- c) Reading assignments will be provided to you the week prior to the due date. We do not know the exact order of readings yet, due to fluctuating activities of the lab, but you will be provided with a complete list of readings that you will have accomplished by the end of the semester and a "moving" list each week.

#### Flex Lab

There will be two 1.0-1.5-hour periods when the Behavior Analysis Research Clinic will be open, Flex lab may be used for assistance, completing lab assignments, or getting advice from the teaching assistants or Dr. Vollmer.

### **Writing Requirement**

The course includes a significant writing component (at least 6000 words). We have included several writing aids, and a template. Grammar instructions are posted on the course website, and you are encouraged to review these materials *before and while* preparing article summaries. You will usually be given feedback on writing assignments within one week.

## **Grading**

- a) <u>Lab Activities.</u> There will be weekly lab assignments (60 points). You will receive a 5-point grade 12 times during the semester. Note: each week that there is a quiz, there will also be a lab activity grade.
- b) <u>Lab Reports:</u> You will submit lab reports 12 times during the semester, using a template/rubric that will be provided on Canvas (5 points per segment, 12 times per semester= 60 points). Note: each week that there is a quiz, there will also be a lab report due too.
- c) <u>Final lab report (20 points)</u>. As your final project, you will turn in an edited lab report based on weekly suggestions.
- **d)** Weekly quizzes: Quizzes (5 pts each) will cover the current reading assignment plus the prior meeting's discussion. There will be 12 such quizzes (60 points)
