# **Course Description**

This course is an introductory survey of neuroscience with special relevance to psychology. Our main objective in this course is to gain appreciation of how physiological processes result in functions of the brain. With an exposition of the tools and perspectives of neuroscience, we will consider how molecular pathways and neural systems produce psychological phenomena. Finally, we will study the application of neuroscience to understand normal brain development, optimize personal wellbeing, and treat disruptions of brain function.

This textbook is <u>required</u> for the course and is provided at a reduced rate through the UF All Access program. Students must OPT IN to the UF All Access Materials <u>within the first three weeks</u> of the course to obtain the text at this rate. This will grant you instant access to the digital text. Students will be billed to their student accounts automatically and if they have Financial Aid available, it will automatically pay for these charges. A document with the instructions and FAQ for UF All Access is located on the Canvas site for this course. <u>You do not need to purchase the REVEL accompaniment to the textbook</u>, but many students find this resource helpful.

# **Prerequisites**

Students who register for this course are required to have participated in an introductory course in Psychology (e.g., PSY2012). Fundamental knowledge in introductory Biology (e.g. BSC2010) is helpful, but not required. The course is self-contained, meaning that everything you need is contained within the course materials. Accordingly, this course is appropriate for students who have a broad interest in psychology, neuroscience, and the biological basis of behavior.

# **Participation & Attendance**

Attendance will not be taken. However, material that is covered during the lecture will be included on quizzes and exams. #### **Course Structure**

To make the class easier for you I did my best to standardize the quizzes, and exams throughout the course. Exams are scheduled for the entire class period on selected Tuesdays (see Course Schedule). You will have a

**Do not be late for quiz or exam class meetings** as you will **not** get extra time to complete the quiz or test. If any student has completed the quiz or exam and left the room prior to your arrival to class, you will not be permitted to take the quiz or exam. You will need to bring an official photo ID (Gator1, driver's license) for quiz and exam days. When you turn in your exam, you are required to display your ID. You will also need a #2 pencil. **Exams:** Each exam will consist of 40 multiple-choice questions worth 1 point each (40 points total). There will be 4 exams total, each exam will be non-cumulative, and you will have 50 minutes to complete the exam. Your lowest exam score will be dropped, so 3 exams x 40 = 120 points total.

**Quizzes:** Every Thursday (with exceptions, see Course Schedule) the class period will begin with a quiz (10 questions, 15 minutes). There will be 10 quizzes in total, each worth 10 points each (1 point per question). Your lowest quiz score will be dropped, so 9 quizzes x (10 questions x 1 point each) = 90 points total.

**Reflection Papers:** At the beginning and end of this course, you will be asked to reflect on your knowledge of Physiological Psychology. The first reflection paper is worth 10 points and the final reflection paper is worth 15 points. To earn full points, you must follow the prompt on the Canvas Course website in the correct formatting.

**Research Requirement:** 10 points (4% of your final grade) in the course involves the completion of a research requirement. The same research participation requirement as in the General Psychology course has been extended to all 3000 level psychology courses. You will have the option to participate in research experiments through the SONA platform or to complete critical analysis papers. <u>Please see the Research Requirements tab</u> in the "Start here" module of canvas for more information.
