Course Description: This course is an introduction to the biological processes of the brain that give rise to behavior. Topics covered by this course include the anatomy and physiology of the nervous system, nervous system development and neurodevelopmental diseases, how brain functioning supports emotion, sensory perception, and learning and memory, the neuroanatomical basis and function of sleep, the role of the brain in addiction and substance abuse, as well as an overview of the neurobiological mechanisms underlying common neurodegenerative and neuropsychiatric disorders. Students majoring in the Behavioral and Cognitive Neuroscience specialization of Psychology or IDS majors in neurobiological sciences should take Behavioral Neuroscience (PSB 3340) instead of this course or should consult with their academic advisor before taking this course.

Course Goals and Objectives: By the end of this course students should be able to:

- Identify the basic structures of the central nervous system.
- Understand the electrical and chemical properties of neurons and how neurons convey signals in the brain.
- Understand the basic principles of psychopharmacology and neurotransmitter function.
- Be aware of the different methods used by neuroscientists to study the relationships between the brain and behavior.
- Have a fundamental understanding of how sensory organs support sensory perception.
- Describe how the brain and spinal cord support the planning and control of movements.
- Understand the physiological role and processes of sleep and biological rhythms.
- Understand the neuroanatomical basis of emotions.
- Describe brain processes that support learning and memory.
- Have a basic understanding of neurodevelopment and the causes/symptoms of neurodevelopmental disorders.
- Be aware of the symptoms and neurobiological basis for common neurodegenerative and neuropsychiatric disorders.
- Identify the neural mechanisms underlying substance abuse.

Required Textbook: Carlson, N.R. & Birkett, M.A. Physiology of Behavior, 13th edition

The course textbook may be accessed in any format (hardcopy, e-book, UF All Access). This option will be available starting 1 week prior to the start of the semester and ending 3 weeks after the first day of class.

Bring to Class:

- Please bring paper/pencil to class so you can draw brain structures and take quizzes.
- Bringing the textbook to class is recommended but not required. Students are expected to read the assigned chapters before class.

Class Demeanor: Students are expected to arrive to class on time and behave in a manner that is respectful to the instructor and to fellow students. Please avoid the use of cell phones and restrict eating to outside of the classroom. Opinions held by other students should be respected in discussion, and conversations that do not contribute to the discussion should be held at minimum, if at all.

Expectations: You are expected to attend class regularly and carry out the reading assignments listed in this syllabus. You are also expected to check your email regularly (at least once a day) and to visit E-learning on a regular basis. Students typically find that for each hour in class, at least two additional hours are required for preparation.

Attendance: Attendance is strongly recommended but will not directly be part of your grade. However, in-class quizzes, in-class participation, and group activities cannot be made up (see grading policy below). Information covered by guest lecturers that may not be in the textbook will also be included on quizzes and exams.

Grading Policy: Course grades will be based on 4 exams, in-class quizzes, in-class participation, and 1-2 group presentations.

Quizzes: Periodic in-class quizzes and for credit in-class activities will consist of multiple choice, fill in the blank, short answer, or occasionally drawings of brain structures. The lowest two quiz grades will be dropped. If you miss a quiz **for any reason**, it will count as one of your dropped quiz scores.

Exams: There will be four in-class exams during the course. Exams may consist of multiple choice, short answer, and 1-2 short essay questions. Each exam is worth 50 points. The lowest exam grade will be dropped. Given that the lowest exam grade is dropped, no make-up exams will be given for missed exams.

Group Presentations: You will be assigned to present 1-2 group presentations to the class as a part of a small group. Groups will be assigned. The number of presentations required will depend on the size of the class (groups in large classes will only be able to present one presentation due to time constraints). Presentations will be short 10-15 minute presentations on a topic chosen by your group from a list of approved topics followed by questions from the class. A grading rubric and presentation instructions will be provided to your group prior to the presentation. Groups will also be expected to participate by asking questions following presentations given by other groups.

Guest Speakers: Guest speakers conducting research in different course topics will occasionally give lectures. These lectures provide opportunities for students to learn about research methods and strategies, as well as gain deeper insights into particular topics. Information from guest lectures will be included on the exams.
