PSY 4625 The Psychology of Pseudoscience

Course Purpose: In a "fake news" and "alternative facts" world it seems that individuals may be vulnerable to believe that pseudoscientific claims are based on credible, scientific evidence. This takes root by using social media and mass media to disseminate (dis/mis)information more widely than scientific findings. With the advent of social media platforms such as YouTube, LinkedIn, and others, self-proclaimed experts can spread misinformation with confidence and flair making it a challenge for the average person to distinguish actual science from pseudoscience. This course will examine pseudoscience from a variety of perspectives, through case studies, analyses, and personal accounts that show how to recognize pseudoscience, why it is so widely accepted, and how to advocate for real science. As this is a psychology course, there will be a focus on pseudoscience in the field of psychology. However, we will touch on pseudoscience in a variety of disciplines.

This course confers General Education credit for Social Science (S). Social and behavioral science courses provide instruction in the history, key themes, principles, terminology, and underlying theory or methodologies used in the social and behavioral sciences. Students will learn to identify, describe and explain social institutions, structures or processes. These courses emphasize the effective application of accepted problem-solving techniques. Students will apply formal and informal qualitative or quantitative analysis to examine the processes and means by which individuals make personal and group decisions, as well as the evaluation of opinions, outcomes or human behavior. Students are expected to assess and analyze ethical perspectives in individual and societal decisions.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- Analyze a broad set of features that one might use to determine where an idea or movement falls along the science—pseudoscience continuum;
- Distinguish scientific skepticism from cynicism or denialism
- Explain the state of empirical evidence concerning several popular belief specimens (e.g., ESP, alternative medicine, astrology);
- Critique bogus claims when you see them (e.g., in the news or on social media);
- Distinguish science from pseudoscience
- Identify pseudoscientific practices/research in discipline of psychology

Course Requirements and Expectations: Keeping up with this online course is the student's responsibility (i.e., not mine). Class lectures, assignments, and additional required readings are only accessible through the course website. Assignments must be submitted electronically through the course website as well. I will NOT accept your assignment via email. In anticipation of technical difficulties, make sure you turn in assignments early and double check that they have uploaded. If you experience technical difficulties, you must contact (call or chat. Don't email) the UF help desk immediately to explain to them your technical difficulty (and send me your incident number via Canvas Inbox). I must have the case number for follow up, but note that this does not automatically extend the deadlines.

All deadlines are in Eastern Standard Time (EST).

- 1) Extensions or make-ups will not be given for students based on technical difficulties on any course material. **This includes but is not limited to**:

NO MAKE-UPS WILL BE GIVEN ON ANY MATERIAL FOR THIS COURSE, except for university excused absences with adequate documentation (i.e., doctor's note). Documentation must be provided before the course material is due unless there are verifiable

extenuating circumstances.

Late Work:. All class work must be turned in on time in the manner outlined in the assignment instructions. Failure to do so will result in a zero on that assignment. Therefore, it is critical that you start your work early in the week each week as waiting until the end of the week may cause you to miss deadlines.

Course Structure

Class Activities (40% of overall grade): In most modules, you will complete an activity online that may consist of written interactive discussions, video discussions, and reflective essays. These are designed to help reinforce content learned throughout the semester. You will be provided with detailed instructions regarding each assignment. There are 10 activities in total. Only 8 of these activities will count toward your final grade as I drop the two lowest grades. The activities are designed to get you thinking critically about identifying pseudoscience and why pseudoscience can present a problem in real world scenarios.

Pseudoscience Quizzes (40% of overall grade): There will be a total of four quizzes this semester and all will count toward your overall course grade. For each quiz, you will create one portfolio entry that demonstrates your ability to apply what you are learning about pseudoscience by finding one current event/item and writing about it in accordance with instructions in Canvas. You can use news articles, editorials, advertisements, advice columns, news videos, photographs, websites, cartoon strips, social media posts, etc. Basically, you can use any item that you can effectively argue may be pseudoscientific in nature such that the information being disseminated lacks scientific authority (and support your assertions with credible science). You must find a different item for each quiz, and you may not use ANY of the items shared by you, me, or your classmates anywhere else in the course such as discussion boards, assigned readings, etc. Detailed instructions are provided in our online classroom.

Applied Pseudoscience Project Presentation: (20% of overall course grade): For your final course project, you will prepare a video recorded presentation that illustrates your ability to effectively critique pseudoscientific items. Detailed instructions are provided in our online classroom.

Turnitin.com: Turnitin.com is a plagiarism detection service (and use of AI detection service) available to the faculty at UF. The website searches your paper for instances of plagiarism (from previously turned in papers, internet resources and publications) as well as the use of AI chatbots. Examples of plagiarism include cutting and pasting Students who plagiarize or otherwise engage in academic misconduct via use of AI chatbots may receive a "zero" (E) for the entire course. Please make sure you read the sections on plagiarism in your Student Handbook and the APA manual. It is your responsibility to understand what plagiarism is and any misunderstandings on your part may not be used as excuses. I submit all of your work through Turnitin.com

Attendance and Participation Policy: Successful completion of this course requires *regular* and active participation in class activities and assignments on Canvas. Lectures and activities will clarify and expand upon information provided in your textbooks. Requirements for class

Grade Dispute Policy: It is your responsibility to stay on top of your grades in the course. As such, you will have three days (3) after a course grade has posted to dispute the grade. The exception to this policy is the Applied Pseudoscience Presentation grade because there will not be enough time to complete disputes and turn grades in by the university-imposed deadlines. Disputes will NOT be accepted after the last day of classes. If you want to dispute a grade, you must write one paragraph explaining the dispute and one more paragraph explaining why your work is correct, with references to the course material, for each aspect of the work you are disputing (for a total of two paragraphs). Then send a private email to me with this information via Canvas Inbox.
