PSY 4911 §SOC1: Research Methods in Social Psychology Fall 2023

Instructor

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Description

This is research methods course focused on personality and social psychology. You will choose a social psychology faculty member (Drs. Ratliff, Rodriguez, Shepperd, Smith, Webster, or Westgate) or one of their graduate students with whom to work. Activities vary across labs and semesters. During Week 1 of the semester, contact the specific professor or graduate student with whom you have been approved to conduct research activities. Complete the PSY 4911 Research Form and indicate Social Psychology under "area."

Objectives

You will learn to perform multiple research skills, including but not limited to (a) data collection, entry, cleaning, and analysis; (b) reading, summarizing, and critiquing journal articles; and (c) managing in-person and online participant data collection.

<u>Text</u>

There is no specific textbook for this course; however, your lab will likely assign or recommend readings related to specific research projects (e.g., journal articles).

Meetings

Lab meeting frequency varies across labs, but most meet once a week for about 50 min. Attendance policies are set by each lab's supervisor.

Activities

Lab activities can vary broadly, but most lab have active research projects that include daily or weekly activity. Your specific activates will be arranged by your lab's supervisor.

In-Class Recording

Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. To "publish" means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
