Welcome! PSY 4930 Developmental Psychopathology is an upper-level undergraduate course examining developmental psychopathology through the lens of empirical research and practical application. We explore how psychological disorders emerge and evolve across the lifespan, with attention to gene—environment interplay, longitudinal trajectories, and mechanisms of risk and resilience. Students will engage with landmark and cutting-edge studies, critically evaluate research methodologies, and consider how findings inform practice and translational science.

- demonstrate knowledge of the basic terminology, principles, and research methods of developmental psychopathology.
- examine the major disorders, dysfunctions, and conditions of child and adolescent psychopathology as related to their possible etiologies and developmental courses, and research-based prevention and treatment approaches as applicable
- demonstrate cultural awareness and knowledge of the development of child and adolescent psychopathology and its prevention and treatment and gain global perspective
- gain skills to conduct systematic literature review, critically evaluate the presentation of scientific ideas and research in original science papers as well as the popular media and synthesize and summarize the key findings from a literature.
- gain oral presentation skills to communicate and disseminate facts, trends, highlights and gaps in developmental psychopathology field across the world
- develop an infographic for community awareness for real-world connection.

Course Requirements

Roundtable Time Discussion (120 points): In each of Module 1-12 during the semester, there is a Roundtable Time discussion board assignment for you to share your learning with peers and engage in discussion of the relevant topics for further understanding and mastery. Roundtable discussions are due on Sundays. See the specific instruction on CANVAS.

Online Unit Quiz (120 points): Every other week, there is an open-book open-note unit quiz to assess your knowledge and mastery of the contents from the relevant modules. Unit quizzes are due on Saturdays 11:59pm. You have two chances for each quiz. The higher grade will count toward your final grade.

Systematic Literature Review and Presentation Project (310 points): This is a group project with systemic review of literature on relevant topics of your choice. There are five phases of this project with two final products: one final systematic literature review paper and one infographic presentation contributing to mental health advocacy and awareness. All project phase due dates are Sundays. See CANVAS for details for each phase of submission.

Late Work Policy:

For the systematic literature review and infographic projects, late submission should be done via email to both the GTA in charge of project grading and me. Work submitted between 24 and 48 hours of the original due date leads to 60% of the earned assignment grade. Late submission and make-up requests after 48 hours of the original due date will NOT be accepted.

Note ChatGPT or other AI tools are making life much more convenient. But learning is not about taking the short cut. For all the assignments I design for my students, I aim to challenge my students to exercise their critical thinking, written communication skills, and content mastery. If you take this shortcut, you underserve yourselves in gaining authentic learning experiences for academic improvement and growth. If you copy and paste what ChatGPT produces for you, that piece of work is no longer your own genuine work. As such, AI generated work is considered as plagiarism with significant consequences in this class. Stay away from it for your own authentic learning benefits!
